

The Callery pear tree is an extremely invasive species that has taken over large parts of the forest in southern Indiana as well as many public areas in the northeast part of the state. Other cultivars of this tree were released after the 1800s, which led to it smothering many native species of trees.

Native and invasive plants featured at Earthfest event

AUBURN — Native plants and invasive species were the main topic Saturday afternoon at the Earthfest 2017 event at Trine University.

Martha Ferguson, Master Gardener and owner of Riverview Native Nursery in Spencerville, spoke on the importance of native plants in local habitats and the roles they play with pollinators such as birds, butterflies and bees.

Ferguson owns the only native plant nursery in the northeast part of the state.

A native plant is described as a plant that was present before the European settlers arrived. One example is the peony.

She mentioned one extremely invasive species, the Callery pear tree. Also known as the Bradford pear and Cleveland select pear tree, all are cultivars of the Callery pear, a small, ornamental, flowering tree that was brought to the U.S. from China in the late

The tree is fast-growing, tolerant of air pollution. disease-resistant, has pretty, white flowers in the spring and serves as the perfect reminder symbol of spring's arrival.

Unfortunately, the tree had one major flaw, its weak branch structure, therefore horticulturists started developing other cultivars with better branch structure. Over time, these were released to the public and used in landscaping practices.

People driving down highways will see Callery pear trees without realizing

Horticulturist Michael Dirr, a leading expert on woody plants, was quoted by NPR saying, "I'm not a crazy, invasive-police kinda guy, but I can see the future and this tree is, I think, one of the biggest scourges we have." Dirr is a horticulture professor at the University of Georgia.

Unfortunately, Dirr said, his comment foreshadows the future state of things for the state of Indiana.

An expert predicts Martin County in southern Indiana soon will have almost 900 acres of forest understory dominated by Callery pear from a nursery that closed almost 100 years ago.

Ferguson describes the Callery pear as "my personal favorite to hate" and noted its presence in many northeast Indiana public areas such as malls, restaurants and parks.

Ellen Jacquart, director of northern Indiana stewardship with the Nature Conservancy and invasive plant education chair for the Indiana Native Plant and Wildflower Society, said, "The lessons to take from this are do not plant Callery pear. If you have any cultivar of Callery pear in your yard, kill it now. There are plenty of non-invasive alternatives. Also, if you see Callery pear growing outside of cultivation, report through Report IN."

to report Callery pear sightings.

Good alternatives are the serviceberry, pagoda dogwood or the redbud tree. Native plants require less maintenance than other plants and need only occasional trimming after the first year of life.

They also improve water quality and serve as host plants for many butterflies

"We have to think of the garden in our homes as more than aesthetics. Grass is a sterile mono-culture, a food desert. We have to garden for the pollinators," Ferguson said.

According to Ferguson, 97 percent of birds feed insects to their young.

On average, chickadees feed between 6,000-9,000 caterpillars to one clutch of babies, and they have two clutches a year.
